This book describes the decisions made in European palaces and the halls of Congress which influenced who settled in Missouri and cast her future as a slave state, although slaves never exceeded about ten percent of the total population. by their very nature these immigrants were self assured, risk tolerant, self reliant and determined to create a better life for themselves and their families. With few exceptions, they were successful. Organized in a topical, as opposed to chronological order, the book emphasizes the day to day life styles of Missouri...
