The diameter of the ducts or conduits has varied from 1 inches to 3 inches. The cost of iron pipe conduits varies with the price of pipe at the time of purchase. The creosoted wooden box varies, according to size, from 5 to 10 cents per foot of duct, and the cement-lined conduit from 10 to 15 cents per foot of duct, if you desire specific information in reference to the lastnamed conduit, which we regard as a very safe one to use, we respectfully...
