Background The child support enforcement program was enacted as Part D of Title IV of the Social Security Act in 1975 (P. L. 93-647). The States operate their own programs within Federal law and regulations and the Federal Government pays for 66 percent of the administrative costs. States are responsible for establishing paternity, locating absent parents, establishing child support orders, and enforcing child support. The Federal role includes monitoring and evaluating State programs, providing technical assistance, and in certain instances, helping States locate absent parents and collect child support payments.
