



Jean Langlais the Man and His Music

Jean Langlais (19071991) was one of the glories of twentieth-century French music, uniting two great traditions. As organist of the church of Sainte-Clotilde in Paris for more than forty years, he maintained the deeply spiritual musical legacy established there by Csar Franck and continued by Charles Tournemire; as a blind man, he was his generations foremost successor to the great blind virtuosos Louis Vierne and Andr Marchal. Born in great poverty in rural Brittany, he came to Paris and studied first at the National Institute for the Blind and then at the Paris Conservatory, where he took a first prize in Marcel Duprs organ class. From his very first published works, Langlais became known as an important composer particularly for organ: he may be considered the culmination of the French post-Romantic school of Widor, Vierne, and Dupr, to which he brought the same love of Gregorian chant and modal harmony as did his mentor Tournemire. Finally attaining his dream of becoming organist of Sainte-Clotilde in 1945, he had a long career as organist, teacher, composer, and traveling virtuoso.
