New Book 400 pages, In a new edition of this classic work in the field of New World archaeology, Alfred Vincent Kidder presents the first regional synthesis and an unsurpassed summary of Pueblo archaeology. He provides an excellent guide to the Southwest's historic and prehistoric sites at the time as well as an early account of the pioneering excavation at Pecos Pueblo. A lengthy new introduction to the book examines the history of Pecos and the enduring significance of Kidder's work. Alfred Vincent Kidder (1885-1963) was the dean of American archaeologists. From 1915 to 1929 he served as director of the Southwestern Expedition for Phillips Andover Academy, and from 1929 to 1951 as chairman of the Division of Historical Research in the Carnegie Institution of Washington, D. C. , in which capacity he turned his attention to the Maya civilization of Mexico and Central America. Douglas W.
