Its cliffs do not extend to a greater height than twenty feet above the surface of the beach; while those of Happisburgh, Paston, and Mundesley rise from fifty to one hundred feet. The cliffs generally consist of clay, sand, and loam. By some writers they have been termed Mud Cliffs, from their dark colour and general appearance. Mr. Lyell includes them in a series called the Boulder Formation. Mr. Woodward, in his Outline of the Geology of Norfolk, considers them to be of diluvial origin, but upon close inspection they are found to contain strata and fossils which partake of the characters, and may be ascribed to various parts of the tertiary period.
